We worked as an assembly line to quietly (there was a Ruritan meeting going on nearby!) and efficiently fill all 80 bags. After the bags were stuffed, we walked across the street to the Grattan Street apartments and knocked on doors and handed out beef, cheese, and Vacation Bible School flyers. It was so neat to observe the kids and teens step out of their comfort zones and make connections with our neighbors from across the street.

The next day, we partnered with HBC's Creation Care Team and drove around Harrisonburg to pick up church members' recycling. We picked up various items including magazines, plastics, junk mail, cardboard, and batteries. We even helped a neighbor move into their new apartment in between picking up recycling. After lunch, we divided and conquered our to-do list for the afternoon: the ladies went shopping for supplies for Friday's project while the gentlemen took all of the recycling to Harrisonburg's Recycling Center.

And then on June 18, we spent three hours working at a dairy farm in Mt. Solon. We were given a tour of the farm and we even saw some newborn calves! We spent the day beautifying the landscaping around the dairy parlor and mending a fence. We also did

We have had great abundance come our way, and we have shared not only cheese but also beef and Vidalia onions with our existing mission partners Salvation Army, Mercy House and Bridge of Hope. We know this food has blessed their clients. It was a pure blessing to deliver this food and see the excitement and appreciation.

We ask you to consider donations of canned goods and other items that store well that can be added to the food pantry. As you may recall, during the pandemic we had food drives and as a result of your generosity were able to feed many families in the area. Are You Contagious?

Happy July!!! As I write this in June, all Covid restrictions have been lifted in the state and things are certainly looking brighter. We no longer have to wear a mask and I hear hugs are running rampant so watch out!!

Throughout this ordeal I've heard a particular word used over and over....HOPE. We constantly speak in a "hope" language.... "I hope we get back to normal," "I hope I don't get sick," "I hope I can see my family soon," "I hope God really does answer my prayer."

So what is the meaning of this word....HOPE? Is it a lukewarm kind of unsure optimism? The Merriam-Webster's definition is "a desire for things to change for the better, and to want that better situation very much."

In Scripture, according to the Hebrew and Greek words translated into the word "hope" and according to the biblical usage, hope is an indication of certainty. "Hope" in Scripture means "a strong and confident expectation" and is akin to trust.

Romans 15:4 "For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide we might have hope."

We believe in the testimony of God in the Word and hope for the results in our lives. Hope is the confident expectation, the

sure certainty that what God has promised in the Word is true, has occurred, or will occur in accordance with God's sure Word. It's an active, dynamic word. It's not sitting twiddling one's thumbs in denial of what's going on around us. Our hope in God's promises won't put us to sleep, it will put us in gear.

As noted in Romans 15:4, we learn through hard times that God is faithful. Our charge is to tell our narrative. Share how HE has worked in our lives. These accounts will ignite a fire of hope in others. We are, in a manner of speaking, spreading the contagion of Hope.

We know that through the Holy Spirit we have that peace beyond all understanding, which is the first cousin to hope. We know God has our backs.

Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

God is called "the God of Hope." This real hope will affect how we think, what we say, where we place our priorities and ultimately what we do with our lives. If we choose to share this hope, this internal peace talked about in Romans 15:13, we will receive joy, comfort and confidence as well. It will basically be a boomerang effect.

Hope can make the difference between life and death. Prisoners of war who stop hoping are much less likely to survive. The same is true of people who are battling life-threatening illnesses. So it is vital that

we nurture this precious gift and re-gift it to as many as we can by example and personal experience.
