

When Grandma Saves the Day

Not many of us are willing to share our humiliating moments with others. I can think of few more humiliating times in my life than when my grandmother had to tow my car for me. I was backing my car up and backed right into a hill on her lawn, stopping up my tail pipe. The way that our combustible engines work, such blockages are problematic. Engines just stop. My car, perpendicular to the street, caused a few problems for the neighborhood traffic. My grandmother, at 83 years old, walks gingerly out to her pickup truck, tells me to tie the chain to my car and yanks my car out of the yard. After unclogging the pipe, I could go on my way—sheepishly and with the nagging feeling that my manhood may be delayed by several decades.

In any event, what became clear is the interconnected relationships that car's engine systems have. Each singular part has a function—even the tailpipe. When parts aren't working effectively, the whole system breaks down. Likewise, the church functions at its best when all of us do our part—whether small or large.

In the coming weeks and months, we will continue to fill positions in the church. It seems that new opportunities arise all the time. You are invited to be a

Passport Youth Camp 2021

After weeks of careful planning and preparation, and a whole boatload of prayer, we were able to attend Passport Camp once again in person! We joined their last session at Furman University in Greenville, SC on July 19th through the 24th. The theme for this year was "Story" and the theme verse was from Hebrews 12:2a, which reads, "Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, who is the author of our faith and the one who brings it to its goal." Each day during Bible Study, afternoon rotations, and worship, the students learned about different daily themes, all of which reinforced the truth that we are all a part of God's story, and each student is unique and plays a vital role in God's story.

As with most events over the past year and a half, Passport looked a little different in order to keep campers, leaders, and staff safe. Each

Everyone wore masks while inside any building and we remained physically distanced all week. Passport also had church groups separated into four different "houses" to keep groups more contained throughout the week. Passport did a phenomenal job keeping everyone safe and they later reported that they had ZERO COVID-19 cases during camp. That number is a true blessing from God!

This year was our youth group's seventh year attending camp. We had a smaller group than usual, but we all embraced the opportunity to get to know each other very well. Our summer intern, Justin Mofield, attended camp with us as a chaperone and the students absolutely loved getting to hang with Justin. We had a ton of fun at the "Out of this World" Dance Party, the Rec Party, movie night, and cheering on fellow campers

(including two of our own) at the Variety Show. Our group also really enjoyed getting to know other church groups in our "house." We spent the majority of the week doing activities with our house, and our students made new friendships among the other groups.

Perhaps the most meaningful and powerful event was our last night during Church Group Devotion time. Justin led this devotion, and he had each person sit in the middle of the circle. Every person who formed the circle took turns sharing positive and encouraging words specifically about the person in the middle. We do not recall seeing a dry eye in the room afterward. We closed that night in prayer, and we could truly feel the Holy Spirit active among our unified group. We are beyond grateful for the opportunity to attend Passport Camp and we are already excited to go back next summer!

We thought it was time for an update on a mission near and dear to our hearts – the Nasaruni Academy in Kenya.

The elementary school had 120 girls attend this school semester. The high school opened up with 9th and 10th grades. Teachers from the elementary level have been sharing the teaching responsibilities with the secondary teachers. There were not as many high school girls attending as were expected. Academy Director Moses has been traveling the area checking on the Maasai girls who had signed up but didn't show up for school. He is hopeful that more girls will attend in the coming weeks and months. The problem is the coronavirus. The numbers have been rising in the area and country. The vaccine is not readily available in Africa and there could be shutdowns if things do not improve. If the villagers are not able to take their animals and produce to the market and are facing hard times, Moses plans to have the program he had once before of using donations to buy food to feed the students, their families and the nearby village.

Please keep Nasaruni Academy, Moses, Alice, the girls and their families in your prayers as they navigate these very difficult times.

The Old Testament

I don't know about you, but I've been struggling to get through the Old Testament. Several of us have commented that reading the chronological Bible has given us a better understanding of the order of events in the Bible and how God used people, including prophets and political leaders, to unfold the history of Israel. I've found it difficult to understand what God is trying to teach me through so many wicked Kings and leaders. I shake my head at why God's people just can't listen. Don't we wish God would speak so directly to us?

God must have known I needed some encouragement and appreciation for the Old Testament to keep going. Last week, I found on my bookshelf Removing the Veil by Dr. Charles Vogan. Very simply, Dr. Vogan states: "Through the events of history, and the great personalities of Israel, God taught them (His people) how to be saved from sin and death." As Christians, we can look back through the Old Testament and recognize our New Testament doctrines. I needed to remember that the Old Testament scriptures were the only scriptures Moses, Abraham, David, Joshua, and all the other prophets had to learn about God, how He instructed them to live, and His promises of hope through the coming

Messiah. In the New Testament, Jesus taught from the Old Testament stories, and He chastised the disciples and others for not knowing the Old Testament scriptures. God had the big picture of salvation and so gave us in the Old Testament the foundation of the story of Jesus. We would be wise to see how the Old Testament stories can help enlighten us with the events of today and remember that God is the same God: yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

"And how from infancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus."

A Poet and We Know It!

Poet and HBC'er Tom Smith has shared his thought-provoking poetry in our services a number of times over the past few years. Twenty-eight of Tom's poems have recently been compiled into a booklet called "Sometimes: A Collection of Poems by Tom Smith." Booklets are currently available in the church foyer.



Praying Continuously

As I have worked on finishing the Chronological Bible this year I have read through all of Paul's letters in the New Testament. One of the things that I found was his frequent expressions of thanks to God for what was taking place in the churches that he was leading. Here are several passages:

Romans 1:8 "First I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is being reported all over the world."

1 Corinthians 1:4 "I always thank God for you because of his grace given you in Christ Jesus. For in him you have been enriched in every way – in all your speaking and in all your knowledge."

<u>Ephesians 1:13</u> "For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all the saints, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers."

Other passages include Philippians 1:3, Colossians 1:3, 1 Thessalonians 1:2, 2 Thessalonians 1:3 and Philemon 1:4.

I suspect that most of us focus on the good that is happening around us when we offer our thanks to God. We have comfortable homes, plenty to eat and family and friends to comfort us. Paul's focus, however, was not on himself but was solely on the church and the leaders of the church. He never focused on himself because of his confidence that God was taking care of all of his needs and already knew what he had accomplished. Instead, he gave thanks to God for the accomplishments of those that were leading the church along with the

growing faith and love that the believers in the churches exhibited. One of the biggest hallmarks of a mature Christian is their focus on others rather than themselves.

On Sunday, August 15, Pastor Matt began a sermon series on prayer by talking about praying continuously. These passages play right into his message. They give us something to add to our prayers when we pray continuously. While we should thank God for the good things we enjoy in life, it is just as important that we give thanks to God and even praise God for the good things that happen in the church. This can include new ministries, the growing faith of the people in the church, the growing love exhibited by the members in the church, a growing membership and the success of the church leaders.

While Paul uses the term "thank" in the passages above, I like using the term "praise" when addressing God. The term "thank" is a simple acknowledgement of gratitude whereas "praise" elevates our thankfulness to exaltation. When we do that we are placing God in a proper perspective by acknowledging that He is our creator and redeemer and there is no one like Him.

So as we think about what to pray for when we pray continuously, think about the church. If you know of someone in the church that has gone above and beyond in performing their duties, praise God. If you see a program that is succeeding, praise God. If you see church attendance increasing, praise God. Paul prayed continuously and I believe this was one of the many focuses of his prayers. Likewise, we should also consider including praise to God for the successes and growth in our church in our continuous prayers.
