Because I Have Been Given Much

My favorite hymn is "Because I Have Been Given Much." It was my mom's favorite hymn and has always had a special place in my heart. The hymn was set to music by Phillip Landgrave in the 1970s. The lyrics are the words of the poem entitled "Because of Thy Great Bounty" by Grace Noll Crowell, who became gravely ill in 1906 after the birth of her first child. Despite receiving the best medical care available, her illness was debilitating. She became an invalid and remained so for more than ten years, during which time she spent long periods of time confined to hospitals and enduring great suffering.

Through the challenges of her illness, she was inspired. She chose to be a light to others and penned numerous poems - stating she wanted her poetry to "help others who were suffering" as she was. Her words would offer peace and comfort to others. Words about God's grace and providence. Words of hope. Words that speak of God's love and care for us.

"Because of Thy Great Bounty" reads:

Because I have been given much,
I too must give.
Because of thy great bounty, Lord,
each day I live
I shall divide my gifts from thee
With every brother that I see
Who has the need of help from me.
Because I have been sheltered,
fed by thy good care
I cannot see another's lack and I not share.

My glowing fire, my loaf of bread
My roof's safe shelter overhead
That he too may be comforted.
Because love has been lavished so
upon me, Lord
A wealth I know that was not meant
for me to hoard
I shall give love to those in need
Shall show that love by word and deed
Thus shall my thanks be thanks indeed.

As I read these verses, I am reminded of Jesus words that instruct us to "do unto others as you would have them do unto you," his words about "loving our neighbors as ourselves," and his words about caring for "the least of these." He calls us to reach out to those in need as He reached out to us. We have indeed been given much.

In these times of fear and worry about illness, shutdowns, isolation, social unrest, and political turmoil, let us not forget the magnitude and depth of God's greatest gift - LIFE, which translates in to being alive in Christ and being vessels of Faith, Hope, and Love to those around us.
