Singing in the Reign

On the heels of hosting Mission Madness in late April, Father's Day weekend allows HBC to host another youth mission engagement. For three days, June 17-19, a youth choir from Wake Forest Baptist Church outside Raleigh, NC, will come to Harrisonburg for a series of events. They'll provide a mini-concert on Friday, June 17 at three local centers: the Summit House, Our Community Place and Brookdale Nursing Home. Then, on Saturday, they'll work at the Still Meadows Enrichment Center by helping prepare the camp to receive special needs campers the following week. They'll conclude their weekend in Harrisonburg with a mini-performance during our worship service on Father's Day Sunday, June 19. We look forward to hosting the choir and seeing how they'll bless our community.

The youth choir from Wake Forest Baptist will consist of about a dozen teenage singers who have been preparing a program for each summer. They routinely tour different communities each summer in order to express the love of God in new and meaningful ways. We thank the Missions Committee for helping support this trip and look forward to their support of the HBC ministry.

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Deacon Nominating

You'll notice that deacon nominating forms are appearing in your Sunday bulletins a few weeks earlier than in years past. This is because as of the November 2021 business meeting, the deacon's terms have been adjusted to begin January 1 instead of May 1. This change means we need to begin finding new deacons a bit sooner.

We invite you to prayerfully consider nominating a church member to be a deacon, keeping in mind the qualifications established in Acts 6:2-3 and 1 Timothy 3:8-13. HBC policy requires that deacon candidates be a member of the church for a minimum of one year and noted for their Christian maturity, passion for Christ and a commitment to the church's mission and vision. We also ask that you ascertain the person's willingness to serve as a deacon before you nominate him/her.

Nominations are due to the church office by June 19.

What Is Faith? What Do We Believe?

As Christians we frequently find ourselves with questions about our faith. Hebrews 11:1-7 is an excellent passage to study whenever you have questions about your faith. It not only defines what faith is, but also defines our basic beliefs – the cornerstones of our faith.

Hebrews 11:1-2 define what faith is: "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see. This is what the ancients were commended for." Faith involves something we are certain of, but cannot see.

An interesting story involving faith occurs in Matthew 8:5-13 where Jesus meets a Roman Centurion. This is an interesting story because the Roman Centurion was not Jewish yet he demonstrated complete faith in Jesus to heal his servant – to the extent that he did not need for Jesus to travel to his house to see his servant. He believed without seeing and Jesus was amazed at that.

A contrasting story occurs in John 20:24-29. Thomas sees Jesus after the resurrection and demands to see the nail marks in his hands before he will believe. Jesus shows him his hands and his side and Thomas finally believes. But Jesus ends this story with an interesting comment: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believed." We all fall into the category of believing in Jesus without seeing him.

The Roman Centurion did not need to see Jesus heal his servant, he accepted it on faith. Thomas needed to

WV Mission Trip

I was blessed to be able to take an outstanding group of HBCer's home with me to Huntington, West Virginia for a weekend. We set off on this wild and wonderful adventure to visit with my home church, Seventh Avenue Baptist Church, and offer them some encouragement as their church and their community continue to struggle in various ways. Over the years, church attendance has dropped drastically, the building has come to see a great deal of disrepair, and the entire city of Huntington still faces an ongoing struggle with the opioid pandemic. According to the 2017 Netflix documentary *Heroin(e)*, Huntington has been called "the overdose capital of America." The pandemic has only increased the rate of opioid overdoses in the area.

It was a bit shocking to go back to my hometown with a group of cautious, curious, and objective eyes. But while there are a lot of challenges that Huntington is currently facing, there is also hope. Pockets of hope are scattered all over the city when you take time to look. And this group of people from HBC was going to Huntington to share some of their hope.

We worked to remind the members of Seventh Avenue Baptist Church that even when our church buildings crumble around us, the body of Christ doesn't stop there. Writer Marjorie Thompson has said that if the church is the body of Christ, as Scripture says it is, then the body of Christ isn't going anywhere. However, the expressions of that body may look different in the future.

We did not go to Seventh Avenue pretending to have all the answers to the challenges the modern church faces. We did go to share with them all of the amazing and sometimes brand-new ways God is calling us to be the church. We shared that God is God and encouraged them to seek what God has in store for them in the future. We challenged them to consider how that might look differently than the ways we've done church in the past.

I am grateful beyond words to the team of folks who went home with me. And I am also grateful to all of Harrisonburg Baptist Church as we continue to walk together as the body of Christ in this place—ready, open, and willing to follow where God leads us!

The prophet Isaiah reminds us, "Thus says the Lord, your Redeemer, the Holy One of Israel... Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"

Mission Committee Updates

Aid for Ukraine: In the May newsletter, we reported that we would be sending \$1,000 to BGAV for aid to Ukraine. We are happy to report that your generous donations have increased that amount to \$4,300.

The Pringle House: Through your donations, HBC will sending \$1,000 to First Baptist Church for the Pringle House fund. JP Pringle lost his home in a fire in 2021.

The Farm Ministry: Keith Turner reports that The Farm Ministry recently became an official non-profit tax-exempt organization. The ministry is volunteer-operated and all donated funds are used to purchase meat and cheese for people in need. The Farm Ministry was formed from four ministries: Cheese Ministry, Beef Ministry, Pork for the Pantry, and Farm Ministry. The Farm Ministry has impacted agricultural producers throughout Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, North Carolina, and Kentucky. They continue to send cheese and beef to the 3 poorest Appalachian counties in Virginia, West Virginia, and Kentucky. The recent cheese delivery will help us surpass providing meat and cheese for over 500,000 meals. We give all the honor and glory to the Lord for providing the resources to make this major achievement possible.

Saturday Bag Lunch Ministry: A few weeks ago, we resumed serving the meals inside. Kathy Ritcher, leader of the Saturday Bag Lunch Ministry, shared the following: "Each week, we pray that each and every one will experience the love of Jesus through our ministry. This past week, a gentleman told me that since he came to HBC for Saturday meals, he feels cared for and feels the love of Jesus. Wow, this tells me God is at work through Saturday Bag Lunch Ministry!"

Used Bibles and Bible Study Materials: Noelle and Danny Carroll are asking for Bibles and Bibles study materials to support Tabernacle Baptist Church in Danville, VA. The church will be taking the materials to Butler, Illinois.

see the holes in Jesus' hands and the wound in Jesus' side before he would believe.

Following in Hebrews 11:3-7, the writer continues by covering the four cornerstones of our faith.

1. God created the universe.

We know that God created everything in the universe and we know that nothing existed before He created the universe.

2. Sacrifice is involved in approaching God.

Why does God require sacrifice? We were created to have a relationship with Him. Offerings are our acknowledgement of His supremacy. But, sin has separated Him from us so an atonement is necessary to satisfy God's offense at our sin.

I was always confused with this passage when growing up. I couldn't understand why God accepted Abel's offering but not Cain's. Both of them appeared to have given legitimate offerings. But then I learned that God was able to see into Abel's heart and into Cain's heart. God could see the good and the love in Abel's heart and could see the evil in Cain's heart. This isn't about what we sacrifice, it is about how we make our sacrifices - what is in our heart when we make the sacrifice.

So in order to gain access to God we must have faith in Him and make sacrifices. Jesus has become our sacrifice. The sacrifice we need to make is giving up our old sinful self and being reborn into the person that Jesus wants us to be.

3. Life after death.

Enoch was a man of deep faith in God. He was part of the lineage between Adam and Noah. And he was rewarded by being given eternal life. We too can receive eternal life through our faith in Jesus.

4. The certainty of God's judgement to come.

Noah was chosen by God to survive a major flood to destroy the evil that had come into the world.Noah was chosen because of his faith.When Noah built the ark, he in effect put into effect God's judgement on the world.

By faith we too can know that there will be a judgement. No one will escape this judgement. However, those with faith in Jesus will be saved and will not experience God's retribution.

In conclusion, as we think about our own faith, think about what is given in these passages in Hebrews. Is our faith like the unwavering faith of the Roman Centurion, or is there a little doubting Thomas in us? Or do we have questions about what we believe? If anyone has questions about our faith or what we believe in, Pastor Matt, Eli or Katelyn or your family deacon would be happy to talk with you further.

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
